Corporate Social Responsibility – Impact Study on CSR Projects

1 Background of CSR obligation, Company's CSR vision and the CSR Project.

- a. The legal requirement in brief and the company's CSR management structure:

The new CSR rules with effect from April 1, 2021 mandate that Corporates now need to formally assess the Impact of their CSR projects. Large spenders such as Ipcalaboratories Limited hence require to do this study for the projects that were completed over a year ago. The Act further specifies that in order to maintain transparency, this study should be done by an Independent Party. For this purpose, the company has appointed M/s Nayan Parikh & Co., Chartered Accountants based out of Mumbai to study the impact of the CSR and report on the projects. The summary of the post assessment report is shared below.

M M Patel Public Charitable Trust, Solapur (hereafter also referred as Trust) is a Charitable Trust under the Bombay Public Trusts Act, 1950 with Reg No E-702/Solapur/ 4/10/2000. The Trust is also registered under Sec 12A and Sec 80G of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

The Trust is implementing CSR Project which is being constructed and developed at Solapur, which includes construction and development of the Medical College, Hospital and Research Centre.

The Trust operates “ ” at Kumbhari Taluk, Solapur.

4 Evaluation and Methodology:

The evaluation approach has been designed in line with the objectives and scope of the project. A consultative approach for the impact assessment has been adopted. The findings have been triangulated based on interactions with key stakeholders, supplemented by primary and secondary research, as per the project-specific research objective.

Process of Research

Selection of the Team

Review of Implementing Agency credentials

Review of need for intervention

Onsite visit and verification

On ground Interview

The research was conducted in the months of July and August 2023. The research broadly involves a review of the literature of the project concerning the past and present activities of the Trust, the standard of education imparted and the facilities provided at the medical college and the hospital. This was supplemented by interaction with the key stakeholders for the project development and validation of questionnaire. The methodology of this study included designing the data points to be analysed and developing questionnaires for the project.

The Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) Development Assistance Committee (DAC), hereinafter referred as OECD-DAC, framework was used to evaluate the intervention support extended for the project.

OECD-DAC framework is used for evaluating performance of social development programs on relevance, effectiveness, convergence, sustainability and coherence. It helps in gaining qualitative understanding of the impact created, stakeholder perception, extent of collaboration with other actors and sustenance of the change.

The methodology followed for detailed evaluation is as given below.

a. Objective of the Study

The objective of the study was to assess the outcomes and impact created on the stakeholders covered under the program and the environment.

Impact assessment was undertaken on the following parameters:

- Whether the project was implemented as per the MOU
- Impacts created under the project
- Overall project performance
- Any challenges, shortfall, gaps in execution or evaluation of the program

The expected benefits from the study are as follows:



- Feedback from the beneficiary (Implementing Agency) about the direct benefits
- Assess the economic benefits in terms of increased and better facility for education and better medical infrastructure for people, particularly economically weaker section of society.

b. Method of Evaluation

The study used the OECD DAC framework¹ for evaluating the impact of the CSR projects. OECD DAC has laid out six evaluation criteria – relevance, effectiveness, efficiency, impact, sustainability and coherence. These six



criteria serve as the core reference for evaluating international development and humanitarian projects, programs, and policies. These criteria provide a normative framework used to determine the merit or worth of an intervention (policy, strategy, programme, project or activity). They serve as the basis upon which evaluative judgements are made. These evaluation criteria have been defined below:

- **Relevance:** The extent to which the intervention objectives and design respond to beneficiaries' needs, policies, and priorities, and continue to do so if circumstances change.
- **Effectiveness:** The extent to which the intervention achieved, or is expected to achieve, its objectives, and its results, including any differential results across groups.
- **Efficiency:** Evaluating how well the resources are used and the extent to which the intervention delivers, or is likely to deliver, results in an economic and timely way.
- **Impact:** The extent to which the intervention has generated or is expected to generate significant positive or negative, intended, or unintended, higher-level effects.
- **Sustainability:** The extent to which the net benefits of the intervention continue or are likely to continue.
- **Coherence:** The extent to which the project is coherent and does not undermine other SDG.

The evaluation criteria are critically examined in the context of the project and

evaluated by posing the right questions and seeking out the performance indicators to assess the impact of the intervention relevant to the criteria.

c. Detailed Methodology

The impact study adopted a four-phase structured methodology for evaluation as illustrated below. The adopted methodology ensured that OECD DAC evaluation criteria were followed throughout to effectively capture the impact of the programs.

- Program Inception & Desk Review
 - Desk Review of documents and reports related to the program
 - Determine the scope of study
- Research Design
 - Developing an impact map and scoring guidelines and overall rating criteria for the projects
- Data Collection
- Analysis & Reporting
 - Analysis of collected data using OECD DAC framework
 - Preparation of Report

d. Program Inception & Desk Review;

At the beginning of the study, NPCO consulted and gathered all the information about the program and reviewed the documents related to the programs. Documents reviewed included the request of the Trust for their CSR projects, their registration under the Bombay Trust Act and Income Tax Act as a Registered Trust.

e. Research design

After developing an understanding of the programs, NPCO in consultation with IPCA finalized the scope and boundary of the study. Enhanced understanding of the program helped in developing:

- Impact map
- Scoring Guidelines

Impact Map: To achieve the desired long-term changes, one needs to establish clear linkages between the project's activities and the desired impact. An Impact map is a representation of the workflow of the project and identifies the various aspects of project implementation, as mentioned below.

- **Inputs:** The financial, human, and material resources used for the development intervention by the company, implementing agency and other stakeholders.



- **Activities:** The actual work on ground, actions taken, or work performed through which inputs, such as funds, technical assistance and other types of resources are mobilized to produce specific outputs
- **Outputs:** The products, capital goods and services which result from a development intervention and may also include changes resulting from the intervention which are relevant to the achievement of outcomes.
- **Outcomes:** Outcomes are the most likely or achieved short term, medium term or long term effects of an intervention.
- **Impact:** It is measured in terms of a significant change in the lives of the project beneficiaries due to the initiation of the project. It could be intended or unintended positive/negative, primary and secondary long-term effects produced by the project intervention, directly or indirectly.

Impact Map is a tool for describing or illustrating how and why a desired change is expected to happen by connecting the activities of the program with the outcomes, impacts and their contribution to achievement of the final goal.

An impact map for this project was developed as part of the study.

Scoring Guidelines: Subsequently, a scoring guideline was designed where OECD DAC parameters were scored and weights were assigned to each parameter to arrive at a reasoned conclusion for level of satisfaction. Various components within the parameters have also been assigned weights. Overall final score of the project on a maximum scale of 5 is also ranked on the same scale for satisfaction.

f. **Weighted Scores were then used to develop a 4-point scale:**

- 76-100 % – *Extremely satisfactory*
- 51-75% – *Satisfactory*
- 31-50 % – *Moderately satisfactory*
- <30 – *Dissatisfactory*



5 Executive Summary of Impact Study of CSR Project- M M Patel Public Charitable Trust

The intervention by IPCA has been successful in achieving its CSR objectives. This conclusion is reached after evaluating the project against parameters and the final score earned. The project score is 4.70 on a scale of 5, as provided in the table below, indicating extremely satisfactory implementation of the CSR project on the developed scale for Impact Assessment of the project.

6 IPCA CSR Project Assessment – Detailed Study of M M Patel Public Charitable Trust and Ashwini Rural Medical College, Hospital and Research Centre

- a. **One of the activities included in the Company's CSR Policy is Promoting education, including special education and employment enhancing vocation skills, especially among children, women, elderly and the differently abled and livelihood enhancement projects.**

As per the policy, IPCA may also set up old age homes, day-care centres and other facilities for senior citizens and measures for reducing inequalities faced by socially and economically backward groups.

IPCA's policy also permits contribution to the NGOs and Charitable Organizations, inter-alia, engaged in the above services.

The CSR Committee discussed the proposal received from **M M Patel Public Charitable Trust** about its CSR Project of construction and development of its Ashwini Medical College, Hospital and Research Centre at Solapur. It was said to be the first private medical college in Solapur District with 560 bedded full hospital. This is also said to be the only hospital in the rural and is having all the facilities and benefits the rural people who are economically poor. People from all the nearby areas like Akkalkot, South Solapur and other nearby areas visit the hospital for treatment. The Charitable Trust also provides free and concessional treatment to poor patients and has medical camps at various villages.

The proposal of the Trust and its intent to expand the hospital and research centre's infrastructure was discussed in detail by the CSR Committee. The CSR Committee approved its support to the cause as it was aligned to its own CSR Policy and objectives of healthcare facility for the economically weaker section and empowerment through education. It was decided to contribute to the Trust Rs 3.50 crore for spending on its CSR project.

b. **M M Patel Public Charitable Trust – the Implementing Agency:**

The Vision and Mission statement and Objectives announced by the Trust is;

Vision:

To make Ashwini Rural Medical College, Hospital & Research Centre, institutions the most trusted and respected group of institutions in the field of health care education, healthcare training and providing affordable health care services. Our medical college will be the most sought after institute in training students aspiring to excel in various faculties of health sciences and be a provider of excellence in medical education, research and patient care.

Mission:

- i. We will be most preferred choice of undergraduate and post graduate training in medicine as well as other facilities of health sciences.
- ii. We will be the providers of most comprehensive and advanced medical care to the people of our region.



- iii. As a rural medical college, we will focus on research for identifying health related problems in rural population and search for the required solution.
- iv. To educate and train our students to provide “fit for purpose” quality healthcare services to the society they will serve and, in the process, become the most trusted and respected members of the society.

Objectives of the Institution:

- i. The main objective of Ashwini Rural Medical College, Hospital and Research Centre is to promote the best in medical education & to produce doctors with global standards while providing affordable health care to the needy people of the society on non-profit basis with state-of-the-art facilities and modern medical equipment.
- ii. To produce high quality academically and research oriented doctors who would serve in rural areas.
- iii. To be an academic institution of excellence both in the field of curative medicine and public health.
- iv. To conduct research in priority areas this would lead to positive policy changes and implementation.
- v. To have a tertiary care super-specialty hospital this would serve the local community and give preventive, promotive and curative services.
- vi. To establish strong foundation of public health and community medicine for the overall upliftment of the society
- vii. d. Facilities at Ashwini Rural Medical College, Hospital & Research Centre –

The Trust is having 27 Acres on which the infrastructure is maintained. There are said to be about 35,000 families staying in the nearby villages. The Hospital and Research Centre is abutting the main road and is accessible from many other villages of nearby Districts. The hospital has 560 beds for different class of patients.

There are three Wings to the Medical College Building. It has separate auditorium, boys hostel, girls hostel, separate mess for boys and girls, Doctors quarters, staff quarters, Dean's bungalow in addition to the hospital. Various Departments of college include Microbiology, Pharmacology, Anatomy, Medicine, Forensic etc.

The hospital is equipped with latest medical equipment including, MRI machinery, Cath Lab machine, CT Scan machine, Dialysis machines, Obstetric OT machine, Ophthal OT machine, OBGY OT machine, Sonography machine, Mammography machine, X-Ray machine, CVTS Machine, blood bank facility, etc.

The various departments of treatment include Medicine, TB & Chest, Psychiatry, Skin & VD, Surgery, Orthopaedics, ENT, Ophthalmology,

The hospital has a multidisciplinary OPD and IPD with specialty services. It also has well equipped and modern critical care provisions like ICU, NICU and PICU. It has scientifically updated Operation Theatre along with all the diagnostic facilities like CT scan, X-ray, Endoscopy, etc. It has a 24 hours functional blood bank and pharmacy.

Various regulatory permissions and approvals for establishing and conducting the undergraduate and post-graduate courses is given in **ANNEXURE-IV**

e. General Charity and CSR activities of Trust

The trust is registered under Bombay Public Charitable Trust Act 1950. As per this act every charitable trust has to reserve 10% of the total beds for Indigent and Weaker Section patient and to provide 100% free treatment to Indigent patient and at concessional rate of 50% to weaker section patient.

The Trust is providing medical services to poor patients under Govt. approved scheme namely Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Jan Arogya Yojana (previously known as Rajiv Gandhi Jevan Dhai Arogya scheme), Suvarna Arogya Suraksha Trust. The Trust provides free medical facilities including general surgery, medicine, food, to and fro travelling facilities under these different schemes.

As the trust is registered under the Bombay Public Trust Act 1950, the trust accepts CSR funds in the form of Corpus and Non-Corpus donations from the Companies. The trust utilize such CSR funds towards the construction of Medical College building for educational purpose, providing free healthcare services to the poor and needy people.

g. Evaluation Criterion :

Evaluation criterion 1: Relevance

Relevance is a measure of the extent to which the program can or has been able to support the suited needs and priorities.

This is done to understand the extent to which the intervention objectives and design respond to the beneficiaries needs. The purpose of the analysis is to capture if the objectives and design of the project were sensitive to the needs of the beneficiaries and stakeholders covered. There is a yawning gap between the demand for approved medical education or affordable healthcare and its supply all over the country including Maharashtra. The medical education in private institutions is a costly affair in the country and still there is a very stiff competition to get admission to colleges. The availability and accessibility of health care facility at close proximity is also a nightmare to many.



There has been enough study to reveal that the nation as well as the State of Maharashtra is in want of quality institutions imparting medical education. A few months ago the Maharashtra Cabinet approved establishment of 9 new medical colleges in the State to meet the rising demand for high quality medical education and healthcare services. The State Cabinet also approved expenditure of INR 4,565.72 Crores for construction of new medical colleges and 430 bed hospital in these 9 Districts. Refer **Annexure – V** for details.





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Evaluation criterion 2: Effectiveness

Effectiveness is an assessment of the factors affecting the progress towards outcomes for every stakeholder and validation of robustness of systems and processes by assessing the utilization of the resources.

The criterion reviews the implementation strategy and mechanism. The purpose of this is to understand if the intervention has achieved its objective and the extent to which it did.

Under this project participation by IPCA the implementing agency M M Patel Charitable Public Trust has expended the money on the objects of the Trust by



expanding the Medical College facility and infrastructure. The Buildings are continuously being extended. Addition and upgrading is a continuous process and the Trusts solicits funds from various corporates and other entities to support its cause. Since the contribution from IPCA is a part of overall total expenditure incurred by the Trust

NPCO team together with the team member of IPCA visited the Medical College and the Hospital and interacted with the College Dean, their Chartered Accountant and their staff. While on the College tour we visited all the sections of the college, including the class rooms, forensic laboratory, other laboratories, library, auditorium, etc. We also visited the Hospital within the campus and saw the MRI, CT Scan, Dialysis, X-Ray and other equipment. There were many OPD and IPD patients in the Hospital. We also visited the record room. The hospital was really busy with activity. The photographs of the various sections of the College and the Hospital is given in the **ANNEXURE VII**

Evaluation criterion 3: Efficiency

Efficiency criterion aims to measure if the project was implemented in a cost-effective and timely manner.

The purpose is to understand if the inputs (funds, expertise, time, etc.) were utilized efficiently to achieve the intervention outcomes. Factors such as budget utilization and timelines have been reviewed.

Utilization of Budget

IPCA had contributed Rs 3.50 Crore to M M Patel Public Charitable Trust for their CSR Project which is being constructed and developed at Solapur by the Trust, which includes construction and development of the medical college, Hospital and Research Centre. The Trust has utilised the entire contribution received in the project.

Project Execution as per Timelines

As per the appeal for contribution received from the Trust in July 2020, it had already started the CSR project. IPCA contributed the amount in 3 tranches in July, August and September 2020. The entire contribution by IPCA is part of the larger amount spent by the Trust in expansion of the college building and adding facilities like computer room etc. well within the timeline.

Evaluation criterion 4: Impact

Impact has been measured in terms of the proportion of respondents who reported having a significant change in their lives due to the initiation of the project.

The purpose of measuring the impact is to ascertain the primary or secondary long-term effects produced by the project. This could be direct or indirect and intended or unintended. Unintended effects are effects that were not planned as a result of the intervention and can be positive or negative.

Impact addresses the ultimate significance and potentially transformative effects of the intervention. It seeks to identify social, environmental and economic effects of the intervention that are longer term or broader in scope than those already captured under the effectiveness criterion. Beyond the immediate results, this criterion seeks



to capture the indirect, secondary and potential consequences of the intervention. It does so by examining the holistic and enduring changes in systems or norms, and potential effects on the environment.

The impact of this intervention is immediate as well as long term. The students have better quality and infrastructure immediately as they come into existence. The Hospital gets better and modern equipment to provide greater healthcare benefits to its patients. Although none of the above impacts can be measure in monetary terms, the benefits the society gets in terms of better education facility to the youth and better healthcare facility and option to the economically weaker section in particular, is immense.

Considering the factors above we are of the view that the intervention has created the desired impact. Interaction with the college staff showed they were pleased with the developments and appreciated the improvements the college has been making.

Evaluation criterion 5: Sustainability

Sustainability as a criterion assesses the likelihood that project achievements will continue after the project. This includes an examination of the capacities of the systems needed to sustain benefits over time. The criterion analyses the resilience, risks and potential trade-offs.

The purpose of this criterion is to look at the longer-term effects of the intervention. Impact evaluations in the short term such as development of organizational quality and capacity that are likely to contribute to the sustainability of impacts for participants and communities in the longer term are expected to be almost certain. These benefits are sustainable in long term.

Evaluation criterion 6: Coherence

Coherence as a criterion assesses if the project is coherent across the policy cycle and the progress of the project does not undermine the progress on another SDG. Whether implementation of the project leads to meaningful collaboration and coordinated action across policy sectors (horizontal coherence), as well as between different levels of government (vertical coherence). "Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery"	M.B.B.S. (This shall be a recognized medical qualification when granted by Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik in respect of 100 MBBS students being trained at Ashwini Rural Medical College, Hospital & Research Centre, Solapur, Maharashtra on or after, January.2017.)

- Note : 1. The recognition so granted to an undergraduate Course for award of MBBS degree shall be for a maximum period of 5 years, upon which it shall have to be renewed.
2. The procedure for 'Renewal' of recognition shall be same as applicable for the award for recognition.
3. Failure to seek timely renewal of recognition as required shall invariably result in stoppage of admissions to the concerned undergraduate Course.

Maha cabinet nod for medical colleges, courts in Vidarbha

Nagpur: The Maharashtra state cabinet on Wednesday approved major projects and schemes for Vidarbha, impacting agriculture, medical education and judiciary fields. From a citrus estate at Amravati, to medical colleges in six Vidarbha districts, to a court in Chikhaldara, there were a slew of announcements for the region in the state cabinet decisions.

Announced first in 2022 and later in this year's budget, total nine medical colleges are being started in Maharashtra. Of these, Vidarbha will get to host medical colleges in Bhandara, Buldhana, Washim, Gadchiroli, Wardha and Amravati. For this, the state cabinet has now sanctioned almost Rs4,400 crore. This project is being implemented with the help of Asian Development Bank. In Maharashtra, medical colleges are currently operational in 24 (of 36) districts. These nine new medical colleges will take the state a step closer to achieving the target of having one medical college in each district.

For Amravati, a new citrus estate is being set up at Masod for a farming-to-marketing approach for oranges grown in the area. The scheme will be executed over 10.81 hectare land and Rs13 crore has been sanctioned for this. To overcome any shortage of manpower, the cabinet has also approved outsourcing route along with deputation postings. The citrus estates will cover Chandur Bazaar, Achalpur, Daryapur, Dharni, and Chikhaldara, with Amravati as the centre and a radius of 50km. The orange orchards will have at least 20,000 hectare of productive area within the periphery.

In more good news for the agriculture sector, the cabinet approved the second phase of Nanaji Deshmukh Agricultural Sanjeevani Project, which was earlier known as Project on Climate Resilient Agriculture (PoCRA). The cabinet has approved inclusion of Nagpur, Gadchiroli, Bhandara, Gondia, and Chandrapur in the project.

This project was conceptualised by the state department of agriculture and the World Bank. The aim is to develop a drought-proof and climate-resilient strategy for the agriculture sector as a long-term and sustainable measure. It also aims to address the likely impact of climate variabilities and climate change. Farmers and village-level communities can apply for financial assistance to carry out natural resource management works as per the Village Development Plan.

The project is for over 5,000 villages affected by climate change. Funded by the World Bank, it is now a Rs6,000 crore project. The cabinet has sanctioned an additional Rs300 crore for it.

The cabinet has also provided some relief in the law and judiciary field, by expanding the manpower and infrastructure. Specifically for Vidarbha, these new announcements include a Civil Judge Senior Division at Umarkhed (Yavatmal), which currently has as Civil Judge Junior Division.

Chikhaldara in Amravati district will also get a gram nyalaya. The central government had in 2008 enacted the Gram Nyayalayas Act. It provides for establishment of Gram Nyayalayas at intermediate panchayat level. State governments are responsible for establishing the same in consultation with the respective high courts. Also, Warud in the same district gets a district and additional sessions court.

Centre administers Centrally Sponsored Scheme for 'Establishment of new medical colleges attached with existing district/referral hospitals

The government has increased number of medical colleges and subsequently increased MBBS seats. There is an increase of 82% in medical colleges from 387 before 2014 to 704 as of now. Further, there is an increase of 110% in MBBS seats from 51,348 before 2014 to 1,07,948 as of now, there is also an increase of 117% in PG seats from 31,185 before 2014 to 67,802 as of now. The State/UT wise details of government and private medical colleges functioning in the country along with seats are at Annexure-I.

The Ministry of Health & Family Welfare administers a Centrally Sponsored Scheme (CSS) for 'Establishment of new medical colleges attached with existing district/referral hospitals' with preference to underserved areas and aspirational districts, where there is no existing government or private medical college with fund sharing between the centre and state governments in the ratio of 90:10 for north-eastern and special category states and 60:40 for others. Under this scheme, 157 medical colleges have been approved in three phases including 02 medical colleges in Maharashtra, 03 medical colleges in Himachal Pradesh & 27 medical colleges in Uttar Pradesh. As per the scheme guidelines, the planning, execution and commissioning of the projects is to be done by the state government. The details of medical colleges approved in the states of Maharashtra, Himachal Pradesh & Uttar Pradesh are at Annexure-II.

Additionally, financial support has been provided to Himachal Pradesh for an increase of 120 MBBS seats in 6 medical colleges for Rs. 144 crore and 17 post-graduate seats in 1 medical college for Rs. 14.50 crore under CSS for upgradation of existing state government/ central government medical colleges for increasing MBBS under-graduate seats and post-graduate seats. Further, under the Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana (PMSSY) support has been provided to Himachal Pradesh for upgradation of 02 Government medical colleges at Tanda & Shimla by setting up of Super Specialty blocks. Further, AIIMS at Bilaspur in Himachal Pradesh has also been established.

Under CSS financial support has been provided to Maharashtra for increase of 700 MBBS seats in 14 medical colleges for Rs. 839.86 Crore and 692 post-graduate seats in 11 medical college for Rs. 345.79 Crore has been provided for upgradation of existing state government/ central government medical colleges for increasing MBBS under-graduate seats and post-graduate seats. Further, under PMSSY support has



been provided to the state for upgradation of 6 Government medical colleges at Mumbai, Nagpur, Chhatrapati Sambhajanagar, Latur, Akola & Yavatmal by setting up of Super Specialty blocks. Further, AIIMS at Nagpur in Maharashtra has also been established.

Regarding upgradation of existing state government/ central government medical colleges for increasing MBBS under-graduate seats and post-graduate seats, financial support has been provided to Uttar Pradesh for increase of 432 MBBS seats in 7 medical colleges for Rs. 518.39 Crore and 556 post-graduate seats in Medical College for Rs. 375.92 crore under CSS. Further, under PMSSY support has been provided to the state for upgradation of 11 government medical colleges at Lucknow, Varanasi, Aligarh, Jhansi, Gorakhpur, Prayagraj, Meerut, Agra & Kanpur by setting up of Super Specialty blocks. Further, AIIMS at Bareilly & Gorakhpur in Uttar Pradesh have also been established.






The Union Minister of State for Health and Family Welfare, Dr. Bharati Pravin Pawar stated this in a written reply in the Lok Sabha today.

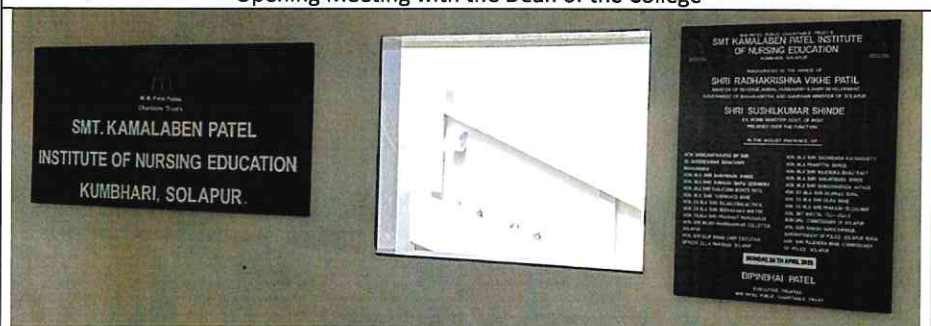

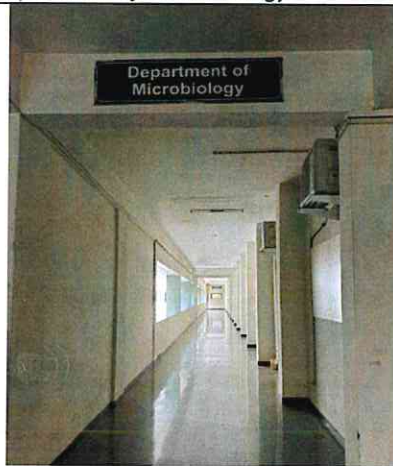

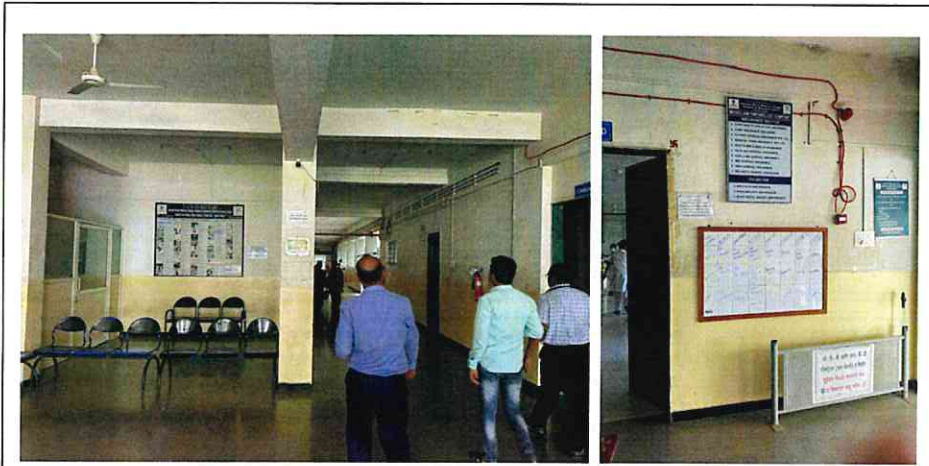
